The Editor Speaks – THE ROUTE OF THE FAGLES

I love trains.

I mean, I always have. My mother used to say that, as a child, I could say "choo choo" before I could say "Mama." I love watching trains, hearing trains off in the distance, reading about trains, and playing with model trains. And I especially love riding on them.

Trains have always been a big part of my life. I got my first train set, made by Marx Toys, for Christmas when I was all of three or four. My family and I used to spend a lot of time at my maternal grandparents' home in Grayburg, between Houston and Beaumont. It was on the Missouri Pacific (MoPac) mainline between Houston and New Orleans.

In Grayburg, there was a long passing siding and also a small rail yard where pulpwood logs would be off-loaded from

trucks onto flatcars for transit to the paper mills of East Texas. There was also a small passenger station and a freight dock. The depot was a two-tone beige and brown structure,

with the typical bay window that jutted out to give a clear view of the tracks in both directions. And of course, on both sides of the station, a large black and wide sign that said "Grayburg," and the red and white Missouri Pacific "buzzsaw" logo.

When I was in the second grade, my mom took my dad, my brother Buzzy and me at the train station in Beaumont, and we rode the train the 25 miles or so to Grayburg. This was around 1963. (Yes, I know, I'm old.) This picture shows the same train which we rode, No. 3, "The Orleanean," as it crosses the SP / T&NO at Tower 74 in Beaumont.

I remember the green tufted chenille upholstery on the seats, and the cheap black rubber floor mats over linoleum on the floor. I remember feeling really high up off the ground as I watched the train cars in the yard go by at eye level. And I remember the conductor hurrying us off the train when we got to Grayburg. He put his little stepstool on the ground, we stepped off, he waved to the engineer, and they were moving again. We stood there beside the moving train as it pulled out, then we crossed the tracks and walked the short distance to my grandmother's house, where mom was waiting for us.

The station there was torn down in the late 60s, but I still remember it, inside and out. I remember being fascinated by a baggage cart with a spring-loaded brake mechanism that would release when you pulled down the handle. Inside the building, there were MoPac calendars hanging on the wall, with a couple of pews around the sides.

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Thinking about Grayburg always makes me smile. I'm sure you have some favorite memories from your childhood that do that for you. But I remember hours of watching trains and playing with my brothers, and sitting on the platform with my dad, counting cars as the trains rolled by. Climbing all over the railcars (in hindsight, probably not safe), putting pennies on the track for the train to flatten, and waving to the train crews as they went by. Sweet times.

People have often asked me why I love trains so much. I guess partly it's the sight of a powerful locomotive laboring to pull a long string of cars, the sounds of horns and steel on steel and brakes squealing, the smells of creosote and hot steel on a Texas summer day. Partly it's the romance of travel, of passing countryside, of new places and new sights. A lot of it is the cherished memories of those days. I love it all.

The MoPac is long gone now – it was merged into the Union Pacific Railroad in 1982 – but it's remembered through the Missouri Pacific Historical Society, of which I am a member. The Texas & Pacific Railway, as well as the Abilene & Southern, were also part of the MP system.

All part of the "Route of the Eagles."

Ramblings from Your Prez






(Above) Dusty and Lonnie discuss switching strategies (and maybe a few other things) during the op session.
